

Position statement

- Harborough District Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) figures at the end of March remain low showing a year to date decrease of 220 (19%) in incidents reported to the Police (1159 down to 939).
- The Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policy Act 2014 came in and ASB powers are all now in place. Dispersal Order used by police in January in an area of Great Glen to address complaints around groups of people causing nuisance to residents, including problems with motorbikes and first Community Protection Notice has been given by Environmental Health regarding bonfires. Early prevention measures using the tiered approach still are first level of enforcement. As last year ASB from young people has been low with most problems raised at meetings being due to neighbour disputes.
- 2014/15 has had the lowest year total for Deliberate Fires for the past 4 years (24) which is real
 positive outcome for community safety actions by all partner agencies. Both Primary and
 secondary fires were down and below targets set. Deliberate vehicle fires and
 Grassland/woodland remain the highest of all deliberate fires and work will continue to drive these
 numbers down.
- However the total number of Primary fires is up because of an increase in accidental fires. There
 has been a spike in accidental electrical and cooking fires which will be a focus for the coming
 year.
