BID FOR SSP STATUS: COMPOSITION OF BOARD

Introduction

1. This paper draws on information from other potential strategic sub-regional partnerships, and specifically from feedback from EMDA in relation to green (effectively successful) and amber (good case but more work needed) submissions. It is intended to inform Leaders of the requirements about size and composition of the 'Executive Board' that EMDA will impose as part of the awarding process.

Welland: The Difference

- Before examining comments for other partnerships we need to reflect that ours is the only applicant body not set up with economic development as its key driver/purpose. In effect we said
 - We set ourselves up to work together ...
 - That has had some good successes ...
 - · People are talking about us
 - We are genuinely different with a real rural agenda and ignoring traditional pointless boundaries
 - Some people at EMDA seem to think we are a breath of fresh air
 - So, let's have a go at becoming an SSP
- 3. Thus EMDA says

"The case for a rural economic agenda was well articulated. However, the partnership is largely of local authorities and, although it has a good track record as an innovative and successful public sector partnership, the case for SSP recognition was not convincing. There is little or no real private sector involvement and the issues of overlap and duplication are not fully thought through."

4. The Welland Partnership is, deliberately, not inclusive. Our successes to date are, predominantly, about delivering local government services within the framework of value for money. We must not allow a wish to gain SSP recognition to jeopardise the Partnership's fundamental purpose. This points to a separate body – a Welland SSP Board – created for that single function. What is likely, then, to fit the bill?

The Balance of an SSP Board

- 5. Lincolnshire Development Partnership's bid has been recommended for approval subject to further consideration of the "size and composition of the Executive team and its relationship to the Board". The Board is all-inclusive and that also is of concern to EMDA because consideration also needs to be given to "the size and flexibility of the Board itself".
- 6. There has, since EMDA published this 'advice', been considerable political activity within Lincolnshire as all authorities strive to secure representation on the 'Executive'. This will not be allowed to happen and, at the time of writing, it is assumed that the Local Government Association (for Lincolnshire) will eventually agree that the best course of action is to accept EMDA's 'final offer' of an Executive of 15 (5 local government, 5 business and 5 other partners) I think 15 is at, perhaps above, the top end of EMDA's target.
- 7. It is interesting to observe from anecdotal evidence that EMDA does not want to see partisanship to one's own authority. They consider that any councillor coming onto the body should represent all of the area in much the same way their (EMDA's) own Board are obliged to pursue the Regional good rather than local/personal agendas. (Attached is a sheet showing comments for the 3 current 'green' recommendations).

An Approach for Welland

- 8. Because the Partnership does other things I can see that the Welland's SSP Board could be established without having any impact upon the current arrangements for management. The '5 Leaders' body can continue, supplemented however the Partnership best decides to involve members in specific services, initiatives and projects.
- In relation to economic development, South Kesteven has already requested that a
 members' group should be established. Such a body would be able to co-ordinate the
 'local government' component of an SSP. Indeed it could comprise the pool from which
 the public sector members of the SSP are selected.

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Proposal

- 10. I suggest we should strive to establish a 9 strong Welland SSP Board containing
 - 3 local government sector
 - 4 business sector, including the chairman
 - 1 education sector
 - 1 voluntary sector
