A. Outline: What is the purpose of this policy? (specify aims and objectives)

The purpose of the review is to plan for a new preventing homelessness strategy to deliver improved and improving services for anyone with a local connection to Harborough District who is genuinely homeless or threatened with homelessness.

B. What specific groups is the policy designed to affect/impact?

Home seekers on the housing register and any person who is threatened with homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless.

C. Which groups have been consulted as part of the creation or review of the policy?

- S Home seekers who are homeless or threatened with homelessness seek security of tenure, stability and affordability in the long term. Some may welcome opportunities to move within and outside the social and affordable housing market.
- S Council priorities include meeting needs for social and affordable housing, achieving sustainable neighbourhoods and communities and making the best use of available resources in the area.
- S Registered providers and local authorities who are landlords aim to meet the need for social and affordable housing, to enable sustainable neighbourhoods and communities, and to manage sustainable, not-for-profit, businesses.
- S Landlords managing private sector tenancies who are looking for reliable and responsible tenants
- S **Other interested parties** including health and social care, advice agencies etc. Their priorities include improved health and wellbeing, reducing inequalities and disadvantage and economic stability.

There are differences between the 2011 Census information for Harborough District and home seekers on the housing register, including:

- S Women represent a higher percentage of home seekers on the housing register (62.4%) compared with the general population
- S Higher percentage of home seekers in age group 16-39 (46.4%) compared with the general population (31.7% of people over age 15)
- S Lower percentage of home seekers in age group 40-59 (30.3%) compared with the general population (37.4% of people over age 15)
- S Lower percentage of home seekers in age group 60-74 (14.5%) compared with the general population (20.7% of people over age 15)
- Slightly lower percentage of home seekers aged 75 years and over (8.8%) compared with the general population (10.2% of people over age 15)
- Slightly higher percentage of home seekers with long term health problem or disability (23%) compared with the general population (22.1%)

A. Age	Young people under threat of becoming homeless need advice and support on how to address the issues they are facing that may cause them to be homeless. This will vary based on their personal and current housing circumstances.
B. Disability (physical, visual, hearing, learning disabilities, mental health)	Disabled people may need to access safeguarding services as a result of harassment by others, or victimization by family members. Those leaving care may require additional support to become independent. People with mental health issues may have specific needs that need to be addressed by services.
C. Gender / Sex	People may need information and advice on how to access support and

	possibly services as a result of domestic violence.
	Some women may prefer women only services.
D. Religious Belief	People under threat of becoming homeless need advice and support on how to address the issues they are facing that may cause them to be homeless. This will vary based on their personal circumstances including religious belief such as a preference for women only services. If they are experiencing harassment or discrimination they may need specific support on how to stop and redress what has occurred.
E. Racial Group	People under threat of becoming homeless need accessible advice and support (in other languages if necessary) on how to address the issues they are facing that may cause them to be homeless. The Homelessness should also contain provision for monitoring equality outcomes including impact on racial groups.
F. Sexual Orientation	Some people may face homelessness because of their sexual orientation (within family/kinship relationships) and need advice and support on how to address the issues they face. Or they may need information and advice on how to access support and possibly services as a result of domestic violence. Some individuals find hostel environments to be unsafe.
G. Transgender	Similar issues to section (F) above
H. Other protected groups (pregnancy & maternity, marriage & civil partnership)	Women may need to access advice and support as a result of their becoming pregnant. Pregnant women who are homeless may need health related advice and support as well as accommodation during and after pregnancy.
I. Other socially excluded groups (low literacy, priority neighbourhoods, socio-economic, etc)	There are potential negative impacts because the different types of tenancy available to home seekers may be confusing for some vulnerable households, including those with low literacy levels. However, provision of clear, concise and easily accessible advice and information to households at risk of becoming homeless could enable them to avoid homelessness.
J. All	The recently approved Tenancy Strategy for Harborough District also contains provision for monitoring equality outcomes. Recommendation that fixed term tenancies should normally be renewed other than in specific circumstances set out in page 16 of the Tenancy Strategy and specific needs should be considered as part of renewal process. Expectation that providers be involved in meeting the needs of homeless people. Probationary tenancies can help in developing a flexible approach to meeting the needs of homeless persons and a pathway to more secure and settled accommodation.
