<u>Objective</u>: To examine the outcomes and value for money of core grants awarded to voluntary organisations and charities.

1. Outcome sought from Panel

1.1 For the Panel, having heard from Charities and Voluntary Organisations and having had the opportunity to question them, to consider the outcomes and value for money and make any recommendations regarding core grants for 2021/22.

2 Background

- 2.1 Harborough District Council awards core grants to four Charities and Voluntary organisations on an annual basis due to their strategic importance in supporting Council priorities through providing district wide services. These are key infrastructure organisations and due to their size and capacity to deliver ongoing services, they attract significant external funding to the district. They are therefore different to smaller voluntary and community groups that deliver 'one off' projects and are better suited to funding though the council's community grants process. A core grant is also provided to Market Harborough in Bloom funded from Market Harborough Special Expenses.
- 2.2 Grants for 2019/20 and grant budgets for 2020/21 are in the below table.
