386 REPORT OF THE LEADER

Budget

The key topic for discussion at Full Council is the budget. The Executive has worked hard to propose what we think is a "good news budget". Despite receiving a hugely reduced annual settlement from the Government, and facing a predicted budget shortfall, we've worked incredibly hard to plug any gap and, not only propose a balanced budget, but find around £1million in community investment. This is investment in broadband, in small businesses, in community projects, in culture & tourism and in disabled facility grants. We're doing this at the same time as protecting frontline services. None of this has happened by accident. We've challenged teams across the council to make savings where possible and I'd like to thank council staff and my fellow members for their input. We're also building on the strengths of our assets, such as The Symington Building and market, in terms of generating income for the council. We're also developing some services to operate in a more business-like way to generate more money for the benefit of taxpayers.

I look forward to debating the budget further at this meeting.

Art project unveiling

I was delighted that so many distinguished guests attended the unveiling of the fantastic new public art project, entitled Swedish Maidens, at The Symington Building last Tuesday. I'm sure you'll agree it is a striking and unique piece of work by artist Anne Schwegmann-Fielding which, as well as being visually stunning, celebrates the rich heritage of the building and its former use as a corset-making factory. I must congratulate Anne and all involved in the project – from the commissioning process, right through to the organisation of the unveiling event. I'd like to thank the Arts Council for the funding, and also like to thank our vice chairman and chairman of Leicestershire County Council for cutting the ribbon on the occasion. It was particularly a nice touch that the project involved local people who donated crockery which was incorporated into the artwork. I hope this installation will be enjoyed by visitors to this excellent community building for many years to come.

Strategic Development Area

I'm sure members will be aware that a committee date has been set for decisions on the three planning applications relating to nearly 1,500 properties at the Strategic Development Area (SDA) to the north west of Market Harborough. This has been a four year journey and it has been very challenging at times. Once the Core Strategy was approved, it was always a case of 'when' these homes would be built, not 'if'. But we put a masterplan in place to ensure this site would develop in the right way and be supported with the required infrastructure, funded by section 106 money. The committee meeting is on Monday 2 March 2015 at 6.30pm at Harborough Market, allowing more capacity for the public to attend. The public are able to make representations at this meeting and I would encourage anyone wishing to do so to visit the council's website where the information on going about this can be found.

Howard Watson Symington Memorial Charity

As members can see, at page 19 of the Council agenda, the Executive considered the governance arrangements for the Howard Watson Symington memorial charity on 1 December 2014.

There are concerns about the Council's ability to act as Trustee for the Howard Watson Symington Memorial Charity, given that one of the charity's objectives is for the relief of poverty, which section 139(3) of the Local Government Act 1972 precludes a Council from acting as trustee in these circumstances. Officers have held discussions with the Charity Commission on the best way to proceed.

I am notifying Council of the requirement to change the arrangements for the Charity. The executive function of administration of the Charity has been removed from the Area Committee and will now be administered by the Executive itself to enable alternative Trustee arrangements to be put in place with a view to the Council resigning as Trustee. A report will be brought to a future meeting of the Executive on options for alternative trustee arrangements.

Outcome of legal proceedings concerning new homes in Broughton Astley

Cllr Pain announced the outcome of a High Court case involving the building of new homes in Broughton Astley (Crane v Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government) which had been made public in late afternoon. The application by Mr Crane was based on two main issues:

- (1) whether the Secretary of State erred in law in concluding that the proposed development was in conflict with the Broughton Astley Neighbourhood Plan 2013-2028, whether that conclusion was irrational, and whether the reasons the Secretary of State gave for it were lawful; and
- (2) whether the Secretary of State misinterpreted or misapplied government policy in the National Planning Policy Framework ("the NPPF"), whether the conclusions he reached in applying relevant NPPF policy were irrational and whether the reasons he gave for those conclusions were lawful.

Mr Crane's application had been dismissed on all grounds, thereby preserving the flagship policy of Neighbourhood Planning.

Sport England was in some cases a statutory consultee. References to 'exceptional circumstances' recommended by the Scrutiny task Panel should not be included and references in the draft document to 'exceptional circumstances' did

not make clear that it was a reference to re-provision of outdoor space where another site had been disposed of.

396 PRUDENTIAL INDICATORS

The Council considered the Council's proposed prudential indicators for the period 2015/16 to 2017/18 and the forecast treasury activities over the same period.

The report fulfilled four key requirements of local government legislation as follows

- The reporting of the prudential indicators as required by the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy's (CIPFA) Prudential Code for Capital Finance in Local Authorities;
- The Council's Minimum Revenue Provision (MRP) Policy, which sets out how the Council will pay for capital assets through revenue each year;
- The Treasury Management Strategy, in accordance with the CIPFA Code of Practice on Treasury Management in the public services; and
- The Annual Investment Strategy in accordance with the Department of Communities and Local Government (CLG) investment guidance.

RESOLVED that

- i) the capital prudential indicators and limits for 2015/16 to 2017/18 contained within Appendix A of the report be approved
- ii) the Minimum Revenue Provision (MRP) Statement, contained within Appendix A of the report be approved
- iii) the Treasury Management Strategy 2015/16 and the treasury prudential indicators contained in Appendix A of the report be approved
- iv) the Annual Investment Strategy 2015/16 contained in Appendix A of the report and the detailed criteria included in Appendix B of the report be approved
- v) the inclusion of Market Harborough Building Society on the list of approved counterparties be approved.

Summary of Reasons

The Local Government Act 2003, as amended, and supporting regulations requires the Council to "have regard to" the CIPFA Prudential Code and the CIPFA Treasury Management Code of Practice to set Prudential and Treasury Indicators for the next three years to ensure that the Council's capital investment plans are affordable, prudent and sustainable

The Council is also required by the Local Government Act 2003 to undertake an annual review of its policy for calculating the minimum revenue provision (MRP) for repayment of external debt.

The Act requires the Council to set out its treasury strategy for borrowing and to prepare an Annual Investment Strategy. This sets out the Council's policies for managing its investments and for giving priority to the security and liquidity of those investments

397 CORPORATE PLAN AND CORPORATE DELIVERY PLAN

The Corporate Delivery Plan was presented to Council. It identified high-level Expected Outcomes of the Key Activities, which would add depth to what the Critical Outcomes will mean for communities in the District. It also contained the headline Performance Indicators and Risks connected to these Key Activities.

The number of Key Activities proposed in the 2015/16 Corporate Delivery Plan is currently around 51 – 26 fewer than in the 2014/15 Corporate Delivery Plan.

The Corporate Delivery Plan is a dynamic document and the development of the Key Activities, performance indicators and risks is an iterative process. For this reason, elements of the Corporate Delivery Plan will continue to be developed, and may change as a result of further review and target challenge sessions. During the 2015/16 financial year, any proposed changes to the content of the Corporate Delivery Plan, including revisions to targets, will be reported to the relevant portfolio holder, the Executive, and Scrutiny, as appropriate.

Reporting mechanisms for the Corporate Delivery Plan will remain the same during the 2015/16 year. The Strategic Performance Dashboard will continue to be produced on a monthly basis, and monthly scrutiny of performance will take place through the internal Performance Improvement Board. Performance Reports will be submitted to the Executive and Scrutiny on a quarterly basis.

The proposed Strategic Performance Dashboard was submitted. This was based on the current dashboard (for the 2014/15 year) with some alterations to reflect the draft 2015/16 Corporate Delivery Plan. The proposed Strategic Performance Dashboard contained approximately 30 Key Performance Indicators to provide an overview of the Council's performance in achieving its four priorities.

RESOLVED that

- i) the Corporate Plan for the 2015/16 year as set out at Appendix A to the report. be approved
- ii) the Corporate Delivery Plan for the 2015/16 year as set out at Appendix B to the report be approved.

Summary of Reasons

The Corporate Plan and Corporate Delivery Plan are documents which outline the Council's Vision, Priorities, Critical Outcomes and associated Key Activities.

Both of the documents are underpinned by the Council's vision, which is:

"Working with communities in a vibrant, safe and prosperous District."

Four priorities have been identified for the 2015/16 year. Both the Corporate Plan and the Corporate Delivery Plan are structured around the delivery of these four priorities:

- Working with communities to develop places in which to live and be happy.
- Provide public services which are effective and deliver value for money.
- Encourage a vibrant and sustainable business community intent on prosperity, employment and learning opportunities.
- Support the vulnerable in the communities where they live.

The Corporate Plan for the 2015/16 year is the overarching public document which sets out the Council's vision for the District, its ambitions and priorities and how it will work with its partners and the community to ensure that living in, working in, and visiting the District is the best possible experience. It is based on information about the area and customer feedback and identifies how the Council will achieve its long-term vision.

The Corporate Delivery Plan for the 2015/16 year is the Council's annual high-level plan that sets out how it will deliver its vision and priorities through Critical Outcomes and Key Activities during the forthcoming financial year. There should be a clear 'golden thread' that links these two documents.

398 GENERAL FUND REVENUE ESTIMATES AND CAPITAL PROGRAMME

The Portfolio holder for Finance and Assets presented a revised motion which recommended a 5% reduction in the Harborough District Council element of the Council Tax (excluding special expense items)

The Section 151 officer provided the following comment

'The proposed reduction in Council Tax for 2015/16 reduces on a permanent basis the Council Tax amount on which any future Council Tax increases would be calculated and on which Council tax referendum levels would be calculated. The Council Tax Yield will reduce from £5,404,278 to £5,161,628 on a recurrent basis. At a time of overall reduction in public sector finances and the current legislation regarding Council Tax referendums the reduction in the locally generated Council Tax will impact on the Council on a recurrent basis resulting in a reduction in overall funding options available to the Council to balance the budget in future years. The criteria applied the Council tax referendum in 2015/16 was that a referendum would be required if Council Tax was to increase by 2% or over. By implication this will impact on future Council tax yields being calculated on a reduced baseline figure. Member's attention is drawn to the fact that in recent years there has been increases each year in the Council Taxbase arising from Housing Growth. This will partially mitigate for the real terms reduction in total Council Tax Yield over the next few years, but minimises opportunities to direct any increase in the taxbase to other Council priorities. The ongoing impact of the motion

reducing Council Tax will depend on future year's Council tax proposals and whether there is a continuation of Council Tax freeze grant and whether the Council takes up the offer of the freeze grant.

The motion for a reduction in Council Tax increases the utilisation of the General Reserve Fund earmarked reserve on an recurrent basis from £141K supporting the 2014/15 budget to £243K supporting the 2015/16 budget. The Council maintains healthy levels of reserves. Given the Council's healthy level of reserves the additional utilisation of the reserves in 2015/16 (instead of further savings proposals) is acceptable. In the light of continuing austerity and reductions in Central Government funding it is recommended that in formulating the Medium Term Financial Strategy (following the next comprehensive spending review) that the Council seeks to remove the reliance on reserves to offset the impact of this motion on the overall finances of the Council on a recurrent basis as soon as possible.'

RESOLVED that

- i) 2015/2016 General Fund Revenue Account Net Expenditure Budget of £11,681,544 as set out in Appendix A resulting in a decrease in the District band D Council tax excluding Special Expense items of 5% for 2015/2016 be approved
- ii) The General Fund Budget as set out in Appendix A be approved
- iii) The Capital programme as set out in Appendix E be approved
- iv) The tolerance level for the Capital Programme be approved as set out in paragraph 4.7.8 of the report
- v) The Fees and Charges as set out in Appendix F be approved
- vi) A delegation to the Section 151 officer in consultation with the Portfolio Holder for Finance, Assets and Development be approved to agree new fees and charges during the year and agree changes to fees and charges where required.

The Council must statutorily set a balanced budget to charge its duties and responsibilities by 11 March. This motion proposes a revision to the General Fund Revenue Account Net Expenditure from £11,924,194 to £11,681,544 . if approved this results in a 5% reduction in District band D Council tax (excluding special expense items 0 for 2015/2016

2. Calculate that the Council Tax Requirement for the Council's own purposes for 2015/16 (excluding Parish precepts) is £5,404,278.
3. That the following amounts be calculated by the Council for the year 2015/16 in accordance with new Sections 31 to 36 of the Act:
- (a) £34,240,694 being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(2) of the Act taking into account all precepts issued to it by Parish Councils.
- (b) £27,848,764 being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(3) of the Act.

(h) Calculation of Basic Amounts of Council Tax by parish for Different Valuation Bands

The amounts shown in **Table A** attached being the amounts given by multiplying the amounts at 3(g) above by the number which, in the proportion set out in Section 5(1) of the Act, is applicable to dwellings listed in a particular valuation band divided by the number which in that proportion is applicable to dwellings listed in valuation band D, calculated by the Council, in accordance with Section 36(1) of the Act, as the amounts to be taken into account for the year in respect of categories of dwellings listed in different valuation bands.

3. That it be noted for the year 2015/16 the major precepting authorities have issued precepts to the Council, in accordance with Section 40 of the Local Government Finance Act 1992, as amended, for each category of dwellings in the Council's area as indicated in the table below:-

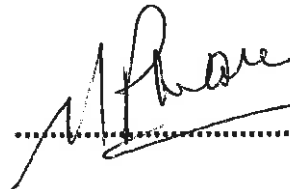
